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Lesson Plans And Writing Objectives

In the objectives section of your lesson plan, write precise and delineated goals for what you want your students to be able to accomplish after the lesson is completed. Here is an example: Let's say that you are writing a lesson plan on nutrition. For this unit plan, your objective for the lesson is for students to identify the food groups, learn about the food pyramid, and name a few examples of healthy and unhealthy foods.

In a lesson plan, the final destination (identifying iambic pentameter or listing important events in the life of Benjamin Franklin, for example) for your students is the objective(s) of the lesson. To take the analogy one step further, objectives are what drive a lesson.

The key to writing learning objectives is to make them SMART: Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Relevant, and Timely. Your assessment will tell you whether your objective was specific and measurable enough, while the lesson context dictates the objective's attainability, relevance, and timeliness. When writing a performance objective for a lesson plan, include (1) the task, (2) the condition, and (3) the criteria. Task (what): The main part of a performance objective involves a task or behavior. In other words, what do you want students to be able to do?
